

DR. A. G. ROSS


Alexander Grant Ross was born in Woodstock New Brunswick on January 29th, 1894. He entered McGill University in the fall of 1914 and went overseas with the McGill Hospital Unit in May of 1915. While overseas he and Dr. F. G. Miller made plans to practise together after the war and so entered into a partnership at Eik Point immediately after his graduation. This partnership lasted for 46 years until his death on August 21st, 1968.

The first 15 years of the partnership had been the pioneer rural type of practice with Model T Fords in the summer and horses in the winter. The partners built a small private hospital in 1923 which operated until 1928 when a municipal hospital was erected under the Provincial Hospital Department.

During World War II Dr. Ross enlisted as M.O. for a Saskatchewan battalion. Because of his age of 45 he did not go overseas, however he did serve on a couple of trips on the Lady Nelson Hospital Ship. After this service Dr. Ross went to Vegreville, Alberta, which was without a surgeon. In 1947 he returned to the Elk Point partnership, which had remained in force during his absence.

As a physician Dr. Ross was a careful and accurate diagnostician. As a surgeon he had quick sure hands and sound surgical judgement and he never panicked.

As a citizen Dr. Ross served on the School Board and later for many years on the Town Council he organized the Elk Point Gas Co. which supplies the town from its own gas wells. He was instrumental in having water and sewage facilities made available for the town. He was an elder and strong supporter of the United Church. He was keenly interested in young peoples' activities and taught a class at Sunday School for many years. As a tribute to this fine man our modern Arena and Agricultural Centre was named "A. G. Ross Agri Plex" in his honor.




A Brief History of the A.G. Ross Arena

The idea of building an indoor arena was born in early 1971. Those who were skating or playing hockey at the time, were playing on an outdoor rink north of the Elks Hall. Several people came together including Doctor Dave Didow, Larry Babcock, Ollie Fedorus, Ed Buck and others to form an Organizing Committee. Ollie Fedorus and Allen Buck were part of a committee to select a site for the new arena. They decided to build it close to the schools because this project was really for the children. A building committee set out to find plans for a building that would seat about 1200 people, while another group endeavoured to raise funds and acquire pledges for financial support. They came back with \$30,000 in pledges that was soon used up in getting plans drawn up etc. Mick Fluker, who was running for the Progressive Conservative Party in an upcoming election, paid a visit to Elk Point and set up a meeting with the several of the Townspeople. When he asked the local residents what they would like him to do as an M.L.A., they told him they wanted the road paved to the Salt Plant, a new Hospital, and an arena. Soon after he was elected, Mr. Fluker came back to the Arena Organizing Committee and told them that if they formed an Agricultural Society, they could get a grant for \$35,000. An Agricultural Society was immediately formed with Dr. Didow as President, Barry Goldberg as Secretary/Treasurer, while Ken Palamerek, Edward Pankiw, Ollie Fedorus, Allen Buck, Ed Buck and others were Directors. After they received the \$35,000, the Government increased the grant to \$50,000 and an additional \$15,000 was also obtained. In order to bring the arena to the point where it could be used, a \$25,000 loan was obtained from the Toronto Dominion Bank. October was fast approaching so Ed Buck got things going by removing the top soil and got the foundation in. The Federal Government had a "Winter Works Program" for the winter of 1971/72 and men could be hired and their wages paid for by the Government. Many signed up and Ed Nelson was hired as the building superintendent and construction continued throughout the winter. The first ice was made in mid December of 1972. Volunteers worked around the clock in shifts of a couple of hours flooding the ice. There was plenty of trouble getting the ice to take because it was not cold enough and the ground would not seal enough to build the ice because it was so dry. Soon after the ice was in, an organizing committee met at the Elk Point Elementary School on a Sunday evening to get plans underway for a senior hockey team. Anyone in the community who was interested in playing was invited. Barry Goldberg became the coach, Ed Babanek, Dr. Anderson, Allen Buck were chosen as managers. The team was nameless for the first few games when barry Goldberg suggested the Buckaroos after the old Portland Buckaroos team. It was decided to officially call the the team the Bues. Ed Buck of Bucks Construction was the team sponsor. John Lukevich was working on a scaffold at centre ice installing the lighting for the ice surface when the first practice was held. During this practice, Ed Babenek was coming down the ice at full speed with his head down and skated right into the scaffold, knocking himself out cold. The Bues first game was in the Town of Vermillion, on December 21st.,1972, where they lost 7-5 to the Nighthawks. Their first home game was December 27, 1972 against the same Vermillion team and the Bucs avenged their loss with a 3-1 victory, much to the delight of the 500 screaming fans that attended.

The first goal was scored by Dr. Charles Anderson, with Allen Buck and Babe Sharkey getting the assists. Regular players on the first team were Tom Turner in goal, Dr. Charles Anderson, Ed Babenek, Bob Krawchuk, Dave Petrosky, Jim Tredger, Barry Goldberg, Allan Buck, Irvin John, Ed Soldan, Ed Buck, Babe Sharkey, Ed Gregoraschuk. Other players were Kevin Bjornstad, Laverne Wilson, Ray Lafortune, Ernie Mercier, Marvin Bjornstad, Larry Quinney, Gus Dion, Blaine Easthope, Alvin Johnston, George Anderson, Harvey Aarbo, Clarence Badger and Brian Ward. The Bucs first made the playoffs in the 1976/77 season under the coaching of Ed Buck. They lost three straight games to Two Hills in the semi-finals. The first goal ever scored in the A.G. Ross Arena was scored by Rodney Pacholek. Doctor A.G. Ross' name was chosen to name the arena after by the Elk Point Agricultural Society Board of Directors. Doctor Ross spent 46 years in Elk Point. The building was officially opened on Wednesday, March 6, 1974. The ribbon was cut by Bob Dowling, Minister of Tourism. Special guests at the ceremony were, Blaine Easthope, President of the Elk Point Ag. Society, Mike Habiak, Mayor of Elk Point, Mrs. Ivy Ross, wife of A.G. Ross, Mick Fluker, M.L.A. Bill Bartling, President of the Elk Point Pioneer Circle, Bob Smith, County Councillor, Jim Engel, ass't to Dowling, Peter Walls, Director of Planning and Development Travel Alberta, Sid Holthe, Master of Ceremonies & Principal of F.G. Miller High School. The official faceoff took place between Mike Boratynec and Orin Ockerman, with Blaine Easthope dropping the puck.

Over the past 20 years, plenty have enjoyed the use of this fine facility for all types of sports and events. Thank you to the many people who gave of themselves in yesteryears, the present and the future. It is because of the rural and community efforts that the A.G. Ross arena was built and continues to flourish. The spirit of volunteerism was, and still is strong in the Elk Point and surrounding area. You are all to be commended.
