Ashmont residents gathered together last Sunday to celebrate the arrival of the Trans Canada Trail Centennial Relay Flag coming from Smoky Lake and Vilna. Dozens of community members came out to the event, located in front of the staging area in

Ashmont. It was a day-long event, featuring activities, food and live entertainment. "We had kids' games like bean bag tosses, plink a and Wheel of Fortune," said organizer Linnette Newby. There were also horse and carriage rides giving kids and adults a tour around town. The attendees enjoyed a lunch which included hot dogs, coleslaw and potato salad, along with centennial cake, sponsored by the County of St. Paul. Ashmont Clean Septic and Main St. Convenience also helped support the event. The band Clarence Smith and Friends from Boscombe entertained guests all day. The anticipation was high during the event, as residents awaited the official flag. At 4 p.m., a group of people on quads could be seen approaching the staging area. The group was right on time, and drove up to where the festivities were been held. A young boy named Jordan Fontaine from Smoky Lake passed the official flag over to Robert Bouchard, reeve of the County of St. Paul. Once Newby welcomed the new guests, everyone sat down for a bite to eat. Ashmont residents sat at the picnic tables with Smoky Lake and Vilna residents, where everyone got a chance to meet, which is something Bouchard wanted to see. "It's the centennial relay and it is important that we communicate with our neighbouring towns and reflect on the past," said Bouchard. Trans Canada Trail regional coordinator Mike Bergeron helped put the Centennial Relay together and said he was happy to see people coming out to welcome the flag. "All the communities are so welcoming from Edmonton to here," said Bergeron. "It's like a parade when they come in with the flag." The flag will remain in town until July 9 when participants from Ashmont will take it to St. Paul. Newby said she hopes to begin the county's leg of the relay with moms and tots and end with seniors. "The intent is not a race, but to get involvement from community members," said Newby. The Trans Canada Trail Centennial Relay 2005 is taking place from June 12 to July 23 and will cover 1,100 kilometres of trail. The relay happens on weekends only and will pass through 18 Alberta communities, celebrating Alberta's centennial.
